Annual Spring Auction 17-26 March www.auction.wildtrout.org



This year's is bigger than ever, with 401 lots covering every aspect of fishing, plus books, art, flies (including flies tied by Paul Procter, Peter Hayes and Don Stazicker) and tackle (including some wonderful handmade rods and reels) and experience days. Most of the lots offer the chance to fish on a huge variety of waters from Sutherland to Cornwall, often with the help of a local fisherman and one or two writers and celebrities.

You can bid online at auction.wildtrout.org or by post using the bid form enclosed with the catalogue. From 1 March, you will be able to browse the lots on the auction site. Bidding on all lots opens at 9am on 17 March and lots will close sequentially on 26 March starting at 4pm.

How will we spend the money raised?

The funds raised in the auction directly support the work of our Conservation Officers to deliver in-river habitat improvement projects and give practical advice to anyone who needs help – landowners, fishing clubs, community groups and other conservation bodies. We use the money raised to help keep our hard-working team equipped with tools like chainsaws and waders for them and for the volunteers we help. The funds also play an important role in getting projects off the ground; crucially, the money raised is increasingly leveraging more funds from other sources.

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We will use wisely whatever money is raised; we keep overheads to an absolute minimum (for example, our staff all work from home) to maximise the amount we spend on practical improvement of habitat for wild trout. We run this auction on our own site, so costs are minimal, and we are blessed with fantastic volunteers who, like you, are vital to its success.



Director's Report

WTT members will have seen, in our autumn newsletter, the range of work that we've been up to, from the mighty weir removals on the Yorkshire Nidd and Derbyshire Derwent through to the smaller-scale habitat stuff with wood and gravel in Cambridgeshire, Hampshire and Sussex. Since then, our Conservation Officers have done an "amazing job" on the Granta in Cambs (described so by none other than the Chairman of the Game Angling Instructors Association (GAIA), added another 1km of improvements to the Bourne of Plunket Greene fame, cut into the bunds of the main stem Aire to allow it to use its floodplain, as it should do, and prepared lots more work for the year(s) ahead in Sheffield, Somerset, Hampshire and Devon. Quite a lot of this work has attracted coverage in local and national media, including pieces on Farming Today and regional TV and radio.

As ever, none of this could have happened without extraordinary partnerships with landowners, fishery interests, local river and wildlife trusts and EA teams. Thank you all.

But, does this habitat 'improvement' improve anything? Yep: plenty of evidence in the scientific literature and from our previous projects – see the WTT blog and news items for more information. Usually, though, we don't have the money to monitor and measure; we rely on the tried-and-trusted principle that if we build in physical diversity to a bit of river, it'll respond with ecological diversity. All things (e.g. water quality and quantity) being equal, it would be plain odd if nature wasted the opportunity we can present and very often, we see in unequivocal terms that it doesn't miss that trick.

In October 2022, WTT's Tim Jacklin and EA's Ryan Taylor lead a team that took down a big weir in the River Ecclesbourne, known as a blocker to salmon that gathered in the winter below it. This project was a long time in gestation and left on a dusty shelf until WTT came along and, in Ryan Taylor's words, "made

the impossible, possible." In a bittersweet epilogue, a dead, spawned-out hen salmon was found in December above where the weir had been – she'd evidently made it to new ground, opened up by the weir removal, and seemingly laid her eggs, driving future generations.

A very different project on a very different river: the Bourne Rivulet in Hampshire, a Test tributary and wading ground of Harry Plunket Greene. The photo (below left) is of the riverbank, fairly tightly mown by a flock of sheep in summer 2021. Later that year, WTT (working with Wessex Rivers Trust), lowered

metres of the river's edge along a whole, large field. Skip to May 2022, a tiny bit upstream in the same field (see photo below right). Other than the trees in their guard tubes, all this vegetation is from natural regeneration, safe from livestock grazing, in the first 10 weeks of the 2022 growing season.

Suddenly, the Bourne is ecologically reconnected to the world around it, its margins unequivocally a rich wildlife haven, especially for river flies as they complete their lifecycle! QED.
